The dynamic publisher/editor of *The Crescenta Valley Weekly*, Robin **Goldsworthy, will** share her adventures in spiriting a weekly newspaper. She initiated this local paper in 2009 when the paper she worked for closed its doors. The first issue of her new venture was about to go to press just as the Station Fire, the largest fire in LA County history, began sweeping across the foothill area. As the fires progressed, Robin was evacuated three times while producing that first issue! She will share her adventures and challenges in that first year.

Since then *The Crescenta Valley Weekly* has become the paper of choice for the foothill community, and Robin has earned several awards. In 2013 Assembly member Mike Gatto honored her and the CVW with the California Small Business of the Year award for the 43rd District. (The annual award honors contributions of small businesses in California.) She was also named Glendale Latino Association Woman of the year in 2013.

Robin is also active in her community: she sits on the CV Chamber of Commerce and is president of Prom Plus. She and her husband Steve have been married for more than 32 years, and they have four sons and one granddaughter.

New Orleans Convention 2013

I was lucky to be able to attend this Convention in June and enjoy the great food and great music of New Orleans. The weather was in the 90's with 95% humidity but a good time was had by all in the cool air-conditioned rooms of the Sheraton hotel. A tour of the city showed that New Orleans is bouncing back from horrible Hurricane Katrina in 2005 and the city is rebuilding itself better than before. The rundown levees and flood gates have been rebuilt, houses are being rebuilt, shopping centers restored, and tourism is booming again. Bourbon Street was crowded and restaurants and nightclubs are back to normal. Seeing the growth in New Orleans was a very positive experience.

At the Convention, we met our new National President, Patricia Ho. who used facebook, her website and twitter to win over her opponent. Social media sites are a must for anyone running for office. At the opening night dinner, we heard an all-women jazz band of New Orleans natives. When asked what male jazz musicians thought of their group, they responded "It all boils down to how you play the instrument!"

Our first keynote speaker was Robin Gerber who spoke on Leadership the Eleanor Roosevelt

Way and has written two books on woman in American history to Eleanor. Roosevelt lived her famous words "you must do the thing you think you cannot do," and encouraged others in leadership positions to forge ahead even when you think you are not capable of accomplishing all that needs to be done. Another keynote speaker, Cynthia D'Amour, challenged negative thinking about change in branches with persistent thoughts of "We've always done it that way." It is natural to resist change, but we can always improve our outreach skills and focus on how to achieve our goals. She pointed out that the main reasons people join AAUW are to learn, to help others, and to have fun and meet people. We need to engage members and involve them in the activities and goals of our organization.

AAUW awards were given to Linda T. Alepin, who is the founder of a nonprofit international women's leadership group; also to Melissa Harris-Perry, a MSNBC news commentator and professor of political science at Tulane University, who was an AAUW American Fellow. Another award was given to Olympia Snowe. Ms. Snowe is only the fourth woman in history to be elected to both houses of Congress and the first

serve in both houses of a state legislature and both houses of Congress. She is also the thirdlongest serving woman in the history of Congress.

AAUW now has 165,000 branch members and 30,000 national members and is reaching out internationally, most recently to Northern Australia. Our population of estudent members is growing by leaps and bounds.

All in all, the Convention was educational, inspiring and fun. I made some new friends from our Santa Clarita branch and we are hoping to share further ideas and experiences.



Our next National Convention will be in June of 2015 and will be held in San Diego, California! I hope many of us will be able to attend.
