The Continuing Conflict between Armenia and Azerbaijan

Glendale is home to the largest population of Armenians in the west. Armenians are good citizens – their participation in the civic life of Glendale is measurable; they work hard and have admirable achievements. It is difficult to live in Glendale and not be aware of their contributions. April is the month that they hold their annual remembrance of the Armenian holocaust. And it is appropriate that in April we have an expert speak to us about the history of the Armenians and their struggle for independence and identity.

Major General Mark MacCarley, our April presenter, will talk about the conflict between Armenia and Azerbaijan. With an undergraduate degree from California State University Northridge, the general has earned an MBA from the University of Massachusetts Amherst, then a Masters at the United States Army War College, and to cap it all, a Juris Doctorate at Loyola University. Who can better describe conflicts than a general? The Armenian-Azerbaijan conflict is so convoluted that it takes the legal mind of a lawyer coupled with the training of a general to comprehend and explain it.

A long-time resident of our city, General MacCarley has recently chaired a committee that has collaborated on raising \$350M for Glendale College, where he taught for over 10 years as an adjunct professor of law and real estate. He is also running for the Glendale City Council, after many years of multiple involvements with civic projects in Glendale.

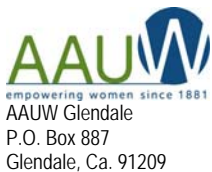
