4th—Birthday of Rosa Parks (1913-2005)

Although it is true that the most famous person associated with the Montgomery boycott was a woman, even the way that Rosa Parks' story is told understates her actual role. Parks is often depicted as just a tired seamstress refusing to give up her seat to a white man. She was in fact a committed long-time advocate for racial justice, having been involved in a range of efforts from working to assist the Scottsboro Boys in 1932 and serving as an officer in the local branch of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People to attending the Highlander Folk School, an educational center for worker's rights and racial equality in Tennessee.

15th—Birthday of Susan B. Anthony (1820-1906)

A leader of the 19th century women's rights movement, national suffrage strategist, lecturer, and activist

15th—The Suffrage Monument dedicated at the U.S. Capitol (1921)

The monument depicts Susan B. Anthony, Elizabeth Cady Stanton, and Lucretia Mott and was sculpted by Adelaide Johnson

18th—Birthday of Audre Lorde (1934-1992)

Writer and poet who addressed issues of homophobia and advocated for civil rights and feminism. Wrote "A Burst of Light" to highlight her response to liver cancer <http://www.aauw.org/2017/05/31/three-musts-for-intersectional-feminism/>

18th—Presidents' Day (Regional Holiday)
